Our seminarians have a variety of pastoral experiences during their

time at the Theologate. Some of these experiences happen during the summers. Others happen each week during the academic year.

A key aspect of their formation is the opportunity to reflect and share with their peers and a formator about their experiences. This happens each week in smaller groups.

There is a ministry of service to the homeless at Termini, where we take some food and coffee to distribute and converse with the people. Some seminarians assist the Missionaries of Charity at their hostel for men. Others volunteer at Centro Astalli with the Jesuits in the centre of Rome.

We have a close relationship with the Italian Marists in the Santa Francesca Cabrini parish which is next door. We join the parish each Monday evening for mass where we lead the singing. Some are involved with the catechetical program on a Sunday morning and one has been taking communion to the sick. Clinton, our deacon, assisted at Sunday masses each week.

Eduardo was recently involved in chaplaincy at a nearby hospital. Joel and Lewis have been part of the team providing pastoral care and catechesis in the prison at Rebibbia.

Some have been involved with young people at San Leone Magno, a Marist Brothers school nearby. This year David and Godlove helped to prepare the children for the sacraments. As well some taught at Marymount International High School which is in our building. It is a bilingual school and it is possible to teach in Italian and English.
