Members of the team collected donations to support a group of homeless veterans who are currently in transitional housing. These vets are newly released from the VA Hospital after battling physical and mental disabilities as well as substance abuse. To show these vets some support as they strive to find jobs, pay rent and get back on their feet, donations of toiletries, laundry detergent, dish detergent, cleaning supplies, toilet paper, paper towels, men's pants, socks, underwear, towels, blankets, kitchen utensils, paper plates, napkins, and gift cards were collected. The donations along with about 30 handwritten notes from the players and coaches were delivered to the veterans.


Marist School Desegregation (Atlanta, Georgia)

In 1961, Marist College (currently known as Marist School) graduate Henry deGive, Jr. (1907-2001) joined with Clothilde ("Johnnie") Ouida Yancey (1914-1972) to form the St. Martin Council on Human Relations, an interracial interfaith organization of men and women committed to ending segregation in Atlanta.

At the same time, Paul J. Hallinan, then bishop of Charleston, had joined with the bishops of Savannah and Atlanta to issue a pastoral letter in 1961 calling for the desegregation of Catholic schools. When Hallinan became archbishop of Atlanta in 1962, he oversaw the integration of Catholic schools. As a non-diocesan school, Marist chose to desegregate and admitted Michael Yancey, son of Johnnie Yancey, as its first Black student.

This May 15, 1962 letter from Archbishop Hallinan to Rev. Vincent Brennan, SM, principal and superior of Marist College, discusses the desegregation of Catholic schools in Atlanta. It reads, in part, "I am confident that both the Archdiocese and the College [Marist] can move into this new era in a favorable posture of true Catholic leadership...We who love Atlanta's Catholicism and are proud of the whole community's forward movement stand to gain much both for the Church and the city."
